

A LESSON ON GIVING TO THE WORLD

GRADES PK-K -- Caring for Creation - Lesson I (Year I, Day 5)

Goal: To introduce children to the concept that God has given us a beautiful gift in the creation of the entire world around us. Students will explore creation and see how caring for it is a prayer of thanksgiving to God.

Materials: Scraps of paper and other recycled materials that could be used for crafts

Lesson: The purpose of these videos is to introduce the idea that God created all things, including the students! Not only did God create all things, He loves them and cares for them. In the creation story, human beings are given the task of caring for creation as God does.

Discussion:

- What do we learn about the way God created the world?
- Is God far away from us or is he very much involved in how the world works?
- Does God seem happy with his creation? Why or why not?
- Who did God put in charge of the animals and the garden?
- How do you think Adam and Eve took care of the animals and the garden?

Activity:

Have students draw a picture of their pet or an animal they would like to have as a pet. Then have them share about their pet's personality, its habitat (whether at home or in nature), how they take care of it, and why it is important in their lives.

Activity: Nature Walk

Bring students outside to a local park or school yard for a contemplative nature walk. Encourage students to walk slowly and pay attention to God's creation, noticing plants, flowers, seeds, berries, colorful leaves, birds and animals. When students point out something they have noticed, you can all say a prayer of thanks to God together. E.g. "Thank you Lord for the sparrows" or "Thank you Lord for the pretty leaves"

Prayer:

Father, we thank you with all your wonderful creatures and all of the beautiful plants and flowers on our earth. Everything in creation came forth from you; they are yours, filled with your presence and your tender love. Help us to always treat your creation with love and respect. Amen.
